Appreciation to the hardworking members of the Dixon Park Training and Assessing Team capably led by Stuart Barnett, Director of Education. This includes our IRB group, who in addition to provide life saving services to the public, train and mentor our members as drivers and crew. Without our training and assessing team there would be no awards, proficiencies and patrols for that matter. The team carried out and processed 374 proficiencies and 612 new Awards for members.

Our Junior Activities (Nippers) Section enjoyed another fantastic season, in no small part due to the enthusiastic and capable Junior Committee, officials and helpers that make it all work so well. Special mention to Chad Dagwell for his capable leadership as the Junior Activities Manager. The whole Nippers section continues to go from strength to strength, and the 2019 - 2020 season will be even better.

It has been a successful season for a number of our surf sports competitors. Special acknowledgment to the success of Lisa Wright (beach sprint, flags), Gavin Stewart (double ski) and Dean Rowe (beach run) at the Hunter Branch and NSW Surf Titles. Peter Brown's surfboard prowess at the Aussies. The Women & Masters Boat Crews at the Branch, NSW Surf Titles, Aussies and the Streets Series. Of particular note was the Masters Crew's 1st place at the World Surf Life Saving Titles held in Adelaide.

The Club had some wonderful social / celebration events including the Nippers Christmas Party, Nippers End of Season Disco, Presentation evening/s, and a Cocktail Party. The Cocktail Party was again a great success and thank you to the organising committee, especially Bernadette Cutler.

It is a fantastic outcome for our members (female, male, children and those less abled or elderly) with new showers, toilets, patrol service spaces, storage, clubroom, kitchen, fitness space and disabled access. I can also report this has been completed with no debt to the Club, and

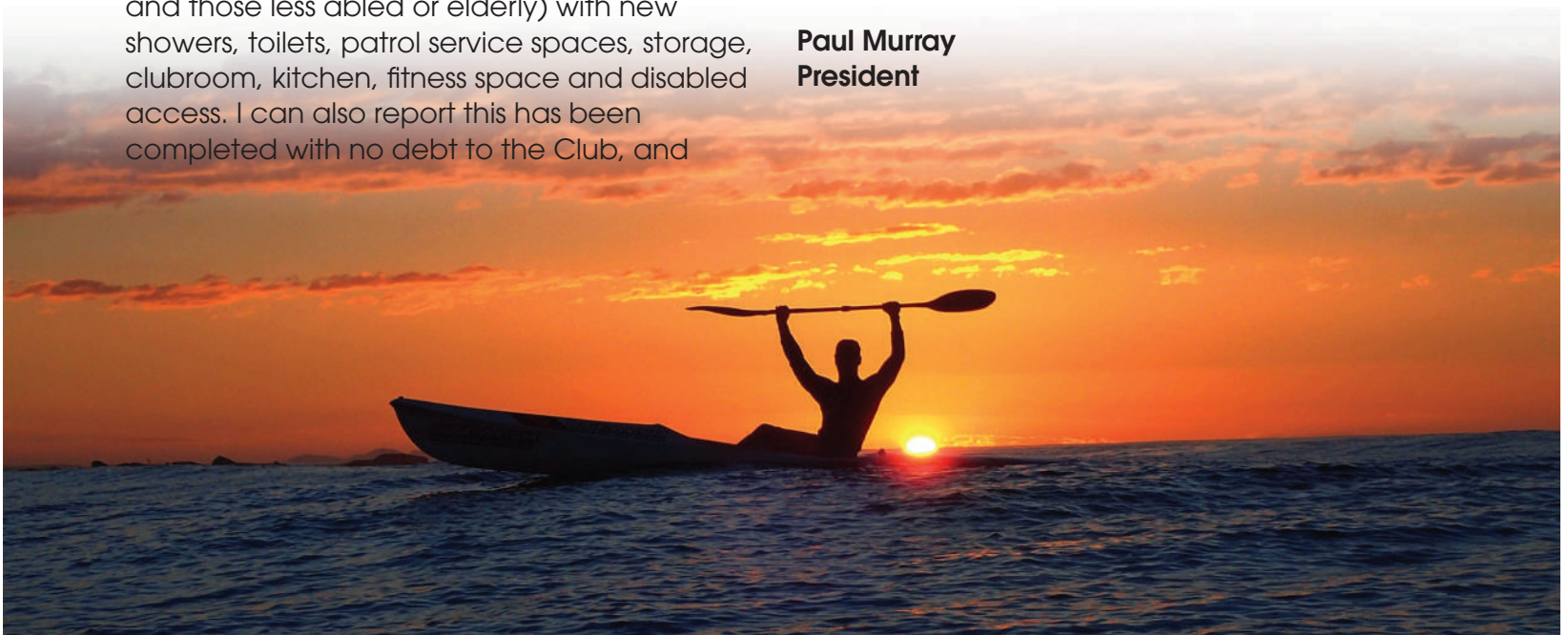

## ADMINISTRATION REPORT

**As a surf life saving club and an emergency service organisation, Dixon Park can reflect on a number of key successes. The support of its membership allowed all patrol requirements to be achieved. This includes the provision of trained personnel to cover the beach on both Saturdays, Sundays and Public Holidays. Nipper membership continues to grow. Well organised parent supervisors provide opportunities for the next generation to experience the beach and surf. The investment in education and training, gives newer members the confidence to participate in patrol activities.**

A standout feature of the 2018 – 2019 Season was the teamwork that was evident within the Club. The patrolling season was approximately 20 weeks, from September to the end of April. During early December the Club's facilities upgrade commenced. All access to the ground floor of the surf club ceased. All life saving services were transferred to temporary

accommodation, that included containers in the car park. Members volunteered their time and skills to assist in moving equipment and arrange it, in such a way that patrols could continue with minimal disruption. Flags, boards, oxy-vivas, ATV, IRBs, motors, rescue tubes, first aid kits, radios ..... the list goes on. Teamwork allowed all of this to happen in one day.

The builders moved in and the demolition started. This was an exciting time. The many years of talking and planning was now taking shape. Once again as a result of significant teamwork.

As the builder continued, members adapted to the changing environment to provide patrolling services. The following members made significant contributions to patrols in terms of the hours of participation. Many of these people went well beyond their scheduled hours. After all, it is a great place to be!

3263 patrol hours were logged for the season. Once again it should be noted that much of this occurred while services were running out of temporary facilities. From the middle of December through to the end of the season life saving and nipper activities continued. Members are to be congratulated on their ability to “go with the flow” that the demands of the building project placed on the operational spaces.

The Executive group meets on a regular basis. Agendas, reports, action plans and minutes not only satisfy the requirements of governance and compliance, but more importantly provides a forum for open discussion and transparent decision making.

As well as the visible indicators of a surf life saving club, Dixon Park has also fulfilled its compliance obligations. Behind the scene, activities like contact lists, call-out teams, equipment checks, financial monitoring and communication processes have all contributed to another successful year for Dixon Park. Addressing these mandatory compliance obligations enables the Club to participate in the process of securing grants. Dixon Park is one of 314 incorporate surf life saving clubs across the country. Many of these clubs and other organisations are actively seeking financial assistance for their projects. Our level of compliance has significantly contributed to our success in securing financial support.

## **FINANCE REPORT**

From a financial perspective, the 2018/19 year was dominated by the upgrade of the club rooms and related works. This project will provide the Club members with excellent facilities in the years to come. The Club received grant funding totalling \$435,130 from Surf Life Saving NSW and Ability Links (St Vincent de Paul Society) in support of the upgrade works and chairlift installation. To date, the Club has contributed \$94k toward the project, including Ability Links funds not fully utilised in the chairlift component of the project. The Club's total contribution toward the actual building works is expected to be around \$172k by the time of completion. The Club will expend some additional funds to complete the fit out of the upgraded facility. At the time of writing, the project upgrade works including the chairlift are estimated to come in at around \$672k. This includes an estimated \$103k direct project contribution by the city of Newcastle.

The Club achieved an operating net surplus of \$69k for the year. The number excludes grants received from Surf Life Saving NSW and Ability Links. Bar & Function Activities provided around \$50k of this surplus. Vice President & Liquor Licence Manager, Geoff Padgett has been instrumental in ensuring the ongoing smooth operations of both the bar services and functions management.

At the end of this financial year, the Club had cash reserves totalling \$333k. It is envisaged that \$130-\$140k of this balance will be required to meet the club's commitment for the remaining portion of the upgrade project and to properly furnish and fit out the club rooms. The remaining funds should leave the Club with sufficient reserves for meet day to day lifesaving activities with an adequate reserve for unforeseen expenditure in the year ahead. The continued profitable operation of bar and function hire activities of the Club will help maintain this position in the future.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Executive Committee for their assistance and support over the last 12 months, and wish the Club and my successor every success in the future.

They manage their patrols to provide appropriate coverage of the beach, ensuring the required skill sets are available to ensure the safety of beach goers. Special mention must be made of those members who completed 100% of their patrol hours (Peter Brown, Jon Baker, Ross Burgess, Neil Caddis, Mark Kirkpatrick, Natasha McIntosh, Toni O'Donoghue, Peter Wilkinson) and in particular 2 members who went above and beyond expectations by completing over 100 hours of patrol – John Humphries and Richard McWhinney. Thanks also needs to be extended to Jon and Curtis Baker who volunteered to provide coverage as IRB drivers to an additional patrol during the season.

During the 2018-19 season, from 29th September 2018 to 28th April 2019, our statistics included the attendance of 31,977 people at Dixon Park beach during patrol hours. Patrolling members provided support and

protection for the community for 3,263 hours, they undertook 421 preventative actions, attended to 39 first aid incidents and were only required to perform 4 rescues from the surf. The proactive approach taken by patrols to identify and manage risks to the general public resulted in the very low number of rescues and first aid incidents.

The regular completion of patrol audits by Hunter Branch allowed us to review the quality and consistency of our patrol services, with the feedback provided identifying areas where additional focus was required. The audits also served as a reminder of the need to ensure established procedures were always followed.



Patrols are the reason our club exists and our patrolling members are the heart and soul of the Dixon Park Surf Club. Their commitment to the SLSA mission is demonstrated on the beach every weekend and we hope to see all our patrolling members return for the 2019-20 season.

## **JUNIOR ACTIVITIES (NIPPERS) REPORT**

**I would like to start my report by thanking the 2018/19 committee for all the hard work and effort that they have put into the season. It truly requires a group effort to make the junior activities run smoothly and give our Nippers a great experience. It is a big commitment to be a committee member but I think everyone would agree that it is highly rewarding.**

Thank you to Paul and the club executive committee for their support of the Nippers this season.

Thank you to our 12 club sponsors that supported the club this season. The support provided has enabled the Junior Committee to effectively run the Nippers program and again fund the club shirts at no extra cost to our Nippers. We hope all the sponsors will be on board again in the 2019/20 season.

This season the club again had significant growth in Nipper registrations. Our numbers increased to 230 Nippers up from 180 Nippers last season, this exceeded the committee's expectations. The club has been able to cope with this growth thanks to a very stable and competent Nippers committee and the introduction of policies and guidelines for our Nipper activities.

The committee again took a strong approach to the registration process opening registrations on the 1st August and Closing on the 31st August. The registration day was a great success in solving registration queries and merchandise orders face to face with the parents. The Parent information night was received well especially by new families to our club giving an overview and expectation of what to expect at Nippers.

Our pool proficiency rate was almost 100% across all age groups. As in previous years the surf conditions hindered our planned ocean proficiency dates. The flexibility of the club assessor Stuart Barnett was greatly appreciated. Holding the 1st Ocean proficiency at Stockton was a success and should be looked at again next season.

This season saw a significant increase in the number of qualified Age Managers / Assistant Age Managers. The club ran Age Manager training (with Merewether SLSC) during the season to have our Age Managers fully accredited. Practical Age Manager training was also conducted by a number of senior club members on beach events and surf awareness which was received extremely well.

The introduction of the Nipper rash shirts supplied by club sponsor Shy Skin was a great success this season. The design combined the required pink hi-vis with the club colours to give our parents a more sun safe alternative to the pink hi-vis vest. Again our club shirt looked great not only at Dixon Park but also at surf carnivals which gave our sponsors great exposure.

The club has a great family culture and this seasons social events again highlighted this. The introduction of the pre-season camp held at Fingal Bay saw a number of families enjoying a weekend away, the numbers will hopefully increase next season. The Christmas party was again a highlight and it was great to see so many of our families enjoying the sunshine, BBQ and jumping castles together out on the Dixon Park grass. The club Cocktail party saw an increase in numbers from last

season. It was a fantastic night that allowed all our club members to socialise off the beach and will hopefully continue to grow. The presentation day and disco were again a great success even through the weather caused the presentation to be held inside the club rather than on the grass area.

We hosted Nobbys SLSC for a combined Nippers session while their beach was out of action due to the supercars. We could not have asked for a better day with our two clubs coming together to put on fantastic day for our Nippers.

We had a mixed bag in terms of weather conditions. We were hampered by a number of wet days and also dangerous surf conditions that caused the beach to be closed. Given our experience over the past 3 season the committee was able to handle these obstacles easily and provide alternative activities for the Nippers with the help of the Age Managers. The second half of the season saw the Nippers shed relocate to the northern building when the club renovations started. This had its challenges, but all in all did not affect our Nipper mornings.

This season again saw a strong showing by our Nippers who competed in Branch and State Carnivals throughout the season. There were many highlights during the carnival season and some fantastic results in both individual and team events including the club picking up 2 branch championship gold medals for the first time in a very long time. Throughout the season our competitors showed great sportsmanship and always gave 100% and the results showed that. Thanks to the parents that provided water safety and officiated at the carnivals because without you the kids would not be able to compete.

I'm extremely proud of what we have achieved together and the stability and structure we have brought to the Nippers at Dixon Park. The first season was tough but our hard work laid the foundation for us to grow the club from 150 Nippers 3 seasons ago to 230 Nippers this season. Our success as a committee is not just measured on the growth in our Nipper numbers it is also the increase in our Age Managers, Water Safety Personnel, Carnival Officials, Carnival competitors and SRC graduates. Along the way we have continued to foster the family culture of the club, it's been great to welcome so many new families into the club who have become friends. All of this has given our Nippers a fantastic experience and an opportunity to learn lifesaving and surf skills in a safe, friendly environment.

Lastly and most importantly, thanks to the Nippers. Seeing the kids having fun, trying their best, improving their skills and being confident both in and out of the surf is what Nippers is about.

## EDUCATION REPORT

**The Dixon Park Surf Life Saving Club Education team for this season was primarily comprised of Stuart Barnett (CTO, Facilitator, Trainer and Assessor) and Neil Caddis (Trainer) with assistance from Trainers Cassie Barnett, Nat Lantry and Brad Newman together with content experts Ross Burgess, Richard McWhinney and Adrian Parker. Thank you to each of you for your contribution.**

I would like to offer special thanks and recognise the efforts of John Baker for his work in training the under 14 SRC squad. The SRC candidates represent the future of the Club so their development and introduction into senior club is very important.

In addition to those mentioned above I thank all of those club members, friends and parents who assisted with water safety, generally.

Once again this season we offered the "lifesaver award" in our Bronze courses. This means that candidates finish the course with the Bronze, Advanced Resuscitation, Spinal, Radio Operators and where possible the First Aid certificate. As a result, we have the benefit of more qualified lifesavers which in turn bolsters our Patrol strength.

As mentioned in the commencement to my report we also offered the Surf Rescue Certificate to our under 14 squad. This group is always enthusiastic and have now joined our patrolling ranks. We look forward to seeing them back to complete their Bronze Medallion in the future.

Overall the Club processed 613 new Awards this season between the Senior and Junior Club.

This season the Club also dealt with Patrol, Award and Junior Activity proficiencies, carrying out and processing 374 proficiencies prior to Christmas 2018. This is an important part of the season and takes a considerable amount of time on the part of the Education team, Nippers Committee and Age Managers.

Over the course of the season the Club ran two Bronze Medallion courses, a Surf Rescue Certificate course, Advanced Resuscitation, Spinal, Radio Operators and First Aid Courses. In conjunction with the Junior activities section we also ran an Age Managers Course and the Junior Activities section of the Club also offered and completed the relevant Surf Aware, Surf Play, Surf Safe and Surf Smart awards for the Nippers.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS  
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES  
Corporate Information

The financial report is for the year ended 30 June 2019 for Dixon Park Surf Life Saving Club Inc. as an individual entity, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Dixon Park Surf Life Saving Club Inc. is a Tier 1 association.

The financial statements were authorised for issue on 5 August 2019 by the officer bearers of the entity.

**Basis of Preparation**

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act 2009*. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with *Associations Incorporation Act 2009*. Dixon Park Surf Life Saving Club Inc has applied the exemption available under Class Order 11/01 in preparation of the financial statements. In this regard the entity has applied recognition, measurement and classification requirements of Australian Accounting Standards for transactions recorded in the financial statements. The financial statements also comply with *AASB 1048: Interpretation of Standards and AASB 108: Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors*.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs. They do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

**Accounting Policies**

a. **Revenue**

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Government grant revenue is recognised as income on a systematic basis over the periods necessary to match them with the related costs which they are intended to compensate.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

b. **Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)**

Property improvements and plant & equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Property improvements are amortised over the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of Fixed Asset	Depreciation Rate
Plant & Equipment	10 – 25% prime cost
Property Improvements	2.5% prime cost

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

c. **Impairment of Assets**

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

d. **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

e. **Stock on Hand**

Stock is measured at the lower of cost or net realisable value

f. **Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors**

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from functions hire clients as well as amounts receivable from a supplier rebate. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

g. **Accounts Payable and Other Payables**

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

h. **Goods and Services Tax (GST)**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

i. **Income Tax**

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

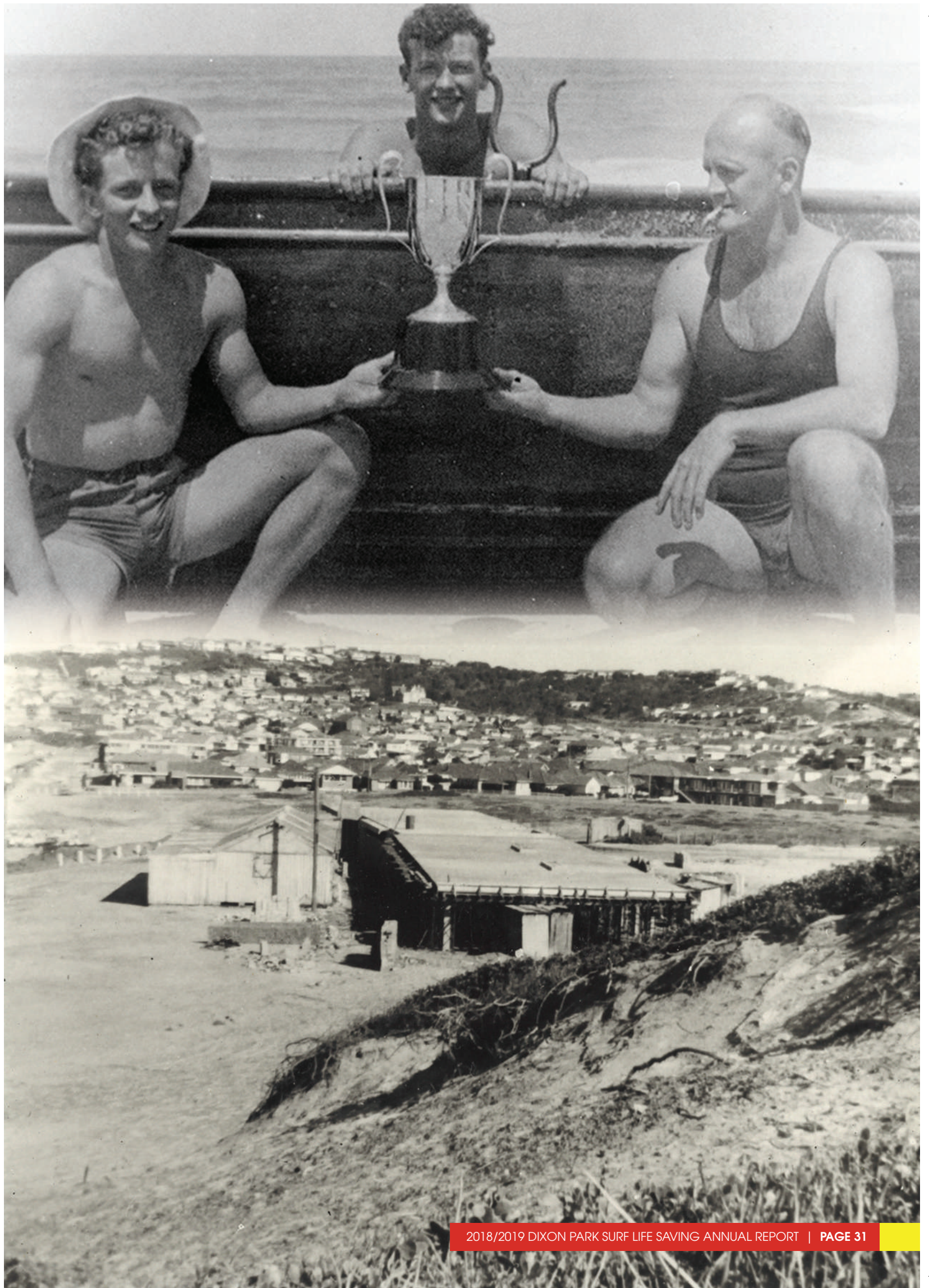
